M-15 Bear Foot Snare Complete (Code: WHM15-KIT1)

Kit includes:

- (1) M-15 Throw Mechanism/spring
- (1) High Tie Off cable (1) Snare Cable
- (1) Stainess Steel #8 Swivel (Parts may be ordered separately)



Other items needed:
Plastic Pail-5 gallon with Lid
Metal Strips to hold snare in place
Bait



Bear is captured trying to grab bait inside the bucket. Deer Proof! Very Effective!

The M-15 is composed of two main parts: the throw mechanism and the snare. Once triggered, the snare will detach itself from the inside of the bucket and cinch onto the bear's paw. The other end of the snare should be attached to a log. The log acts as a drag whereby the bear can move about but not leave the area.

Instructions:

- 1. Cut a 7 inch hole out of the lid. This allows only the leg of the bear and not its head into the Foot Snare.
- 2. Cut into the lid a little opening at the "11 o'clock position" to allow some room for the trap's clamping device.
- 3. Attach paper clips, trap clips, or sheet metal riveted to the cover around the opening. This will hold snare in place on the underside of lid.
- 4. Attach lid and clip the small end of the snare in place around the underside of lid hole.
- 5. Attach the mechanism/spring to the side of the bucket by simply sliding the retaining arm inside the pail together with the trigger arm. The spring stays outside the pail. Mount the trap at the "11 o'clock position" on the pail to prevent the spring from hitting the bear's head at firing.
- 6. Place your bait on the trigger arm. The M-15 is ready to be set up on location.

Location Recommendations:

On location, set the other end of the snare to a large log. It is best to install it about 45 inches above the ground. Pinching the pail into the "Y" or "armpit" of a log and its tree branch is a good spot to set the snare. *It is NOT recommended to attach the canister solidly to a tree.* Less damage occurs, nothing gets torn down, or forced, and the materials can be reused if the bear is relatively mobile.
